



Diabetes Medication Transition

A programme by **WellSouth**

Intended Purpose

This programme is to support transitioning Māori, Pasifika, and CSC (community services card) holder patients with diabetes onto Empagliflozin, Dulaglutide, and Liraglutide, until 30 June 2024.

Eligibility—Initial Consult

The patient must have type II diabetes and either be:

- Māori, or
- Pasifika, or
- CSC holder

AND eligible to be transitioned onto one of: Empagliflozin, Dulaglutide, or Liraglutide.

Eligibility—Follow-up Consult

- Maori, or
- Pasifika, or
- CSC holder

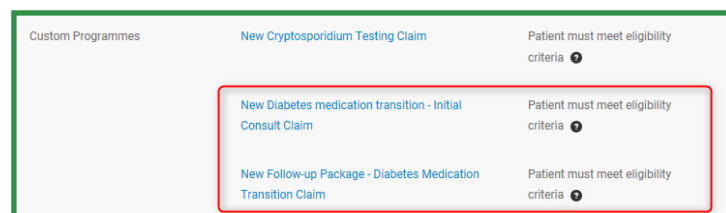
AND recently transitioned onto one of: Empagliflozin, Dulaglutide, or Liraglutide.

Key Information

- A thalamus Dashboard to support identifying eligible patients can be found [here](#).
- The initial consultation is funded at \$60 +GST and should facilitate a GP/NP consult with the patient to determine if the new medication is clinically appropriate.
- The follow-up package is funded at \$40 + GST and should facilitate a clinician checking how the patient is tolerating the new medication, and if other medications need adjusted.

Claiming

Claiming is via the WellSouth PHN portal.

Can a co-payment be charged?

No co-payment can be charged (including issuing prescriptions if required).

When does the claim need to be completed?

Claiming must be completed within 2 months of treatment.
